When Elul Arrives



The very name of this Hebrew month is filled with anticipation: a very real expectation for the High Holy Days, with the month of Tishri fast approaching.

When Tishri arrives, we will once again give thanks to God for our arriving at Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur!

Increasingly, with the passage of years, I find myself becoming ever more grateful for every Shabbes, Festival, and especially the Season of the High Holy Days.

I believe that when I was younger, I also certainly appreciated each of these special times in my life. Nonetheless, these days I am somehow even more thankful for each and every season of celebration, each and every Sabbath.

With Elul's arrival on September 1, we enter into our Season of Introspection, our "Cheshbon HaNefesh." "Cheshbon HaNefesh" is a kind of personal "Inventory" of our words and our deeds in the past year. Elul bids us to carefully consider the manner in which we have been living, the ways in which we have related to those closest to us, to our family members and friends.

It seems to me that we can be so grateful for the insights about daily living which Judaism provides us. Our Jewish heritage brings to us a very astute understanding of human nature, of our strengths and our weaknesses. Elul soon arrives to help us prepare ourselves for the deeper self-examination on Yuntif. Then during the Ten Days of Repentance from Rosh Hashanah to Yom Kippur, we review all our shortcomings and ready ourselves to seek forgiveness on Yom Kippur.

This Season of the New Year is our annual reminder to give thanks to the Holy One for the gift of life, and for the very precious blessings that come to us from forgiveness.

Another way to regard these Holy Days is to call this Season the Time of Teshuvah. Teshuvah comes from the Hebrew root "To Return."

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At Yuntif, Teshuvah is the word for "Return" in its deepest spiritual sense: Return to our Better Selves, Return to Forgiveness. Return to God.

I pray that these Holy Days will help bring each of us deepest spiritual meaning and the blessings of love and forgiveness throughout Yuntif.

Linda and I hope that all our beloved Temple Sinai will be blessed with a New Year of Health, Joy and Goodness in this New Year.



RABBI BARRY'S WORD OF THE MONTH: ZIKORON - MEMORY

The word ZIKORON, like almost every Hebrew word, is so very important in many Hebrew phrases and prayers.

As Edith Samuel has taught in her classic publication, <u>Your Jewish Lexicon</u> (Union of American Hebrew Congregations, New York, 1975), our Word of the Month is found throughout our Jewish literature and writings.

Many will recognize our word in the Shabbes Evening Kiddush: Zecher Li-tsiat Mitsrayim - Remembrance of the Exodus from Egypt.

The Shabbes IS a "reminder of the work of creation." (Your Jewish Lexicon, p. 36.)

The Fourth Commandment: Zachor et yom ha-Shabbat le-kadsho.

Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. (Exodus 20:8)

Here the word Zachor is from the very important root of Zikoron: Zayin/ Chaf/Resh. In Deuteronomy 5:15 we are commanded: Ve-zacharta ki eved hayita be-erets Mitsrayim - Remember that you were a slave in Egypt. As Edith Samuel reminds us, "To be a Jew means to remember always who and what we were — and are." (page 36)

When we speak words of respect for the deceased, we state: Zecher Tsadik Livracha - The memory of the righteous shall be for a blessing. These words are found in the Book of Proverbs, 10:7. Here again, the word Zecher is also from the root of Zikoron: Zayin/

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Chaf/Resh. Often we find the abbreviation Zayin-Lamed following the name of a deceased loved one. These two letters: Zayin and Lamed represent "Zichrono Livracha" (for a male) "Zichronah Livracha" (for a female).

Soon we will participate once again in our Yizkor Service on the afternoon of Yom Kippur. The word Yizkor literally means "May He Remember." Yizkor has become the special name for the Memorial Service on Yom Kippur and on the festivals. During Yizkor on Yom Kippur it is our custom to lovingly recite the names of each congregant who passed away in the past year.

So very much of our Jewishness is intrinsically connected to the concept of Memory and Remembrance. Every year on the Yahrzeit, the Year Anniversary, of the passing of loved ones, we recite their names before we recite the Mourners Kaddish. On each Yahrzeit we light a 24-hour Yahrzeit Candle in our homes just as we kindle the light by their name in our temple. Certainly, each and every day after the passing of loved ones and friends, we remember them so vividly and lovingly. Still, with each Yahrzeit, their cherished memory helps us to sense that they are still with us, in their influence on our lives, on our words and our deeds.

Judaism and our Jewish Faith inspires us to study and understand the breadth and depth of Jewish History. We remember the destruction of both the Temples in Jerusalem on Tisha B'Av, the Ninth of Av, just as on every Yom HaShoah we remember those who perished in the Holocaust.

Whenever anti-semitism reappears, as is happening too often in our own time, we surely remember the years in which anti-semitism was so prevalent in our own land and in the world. And yet I believe, and I pray that from our Jewish Memory and our Jewish Remembrance, we shall be inspired to live with dedication and faith in Am Yisrael, our Jewish People, and in ourselves as Jews.

My prayer is that God will bless us always with the very precious Gifts of Sacred Remembrance, knowing that one day we too shall be remembered for blessing, from our own lives of dedication to the eternal values of Judaism.

RABBI AARON ROZOVSKY,

Director of Rabbinical Services

Rabbi Aaron Rozovsky was ordained in 2018 at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, the seminary of the Reform movement. Prior to beginning his rabbinical studies, he also completed a Master's degree in International Studies with a concentration in Latin America at Central Connecticut State University, and a Bachelor's degree in History with a Spanish minor at Providence College in Rhode Island.

"This is my dream job," Rozovsky says of his new role with the ISJL. "To serve small Jewish communities throughout the

South who have added so much to the American fabric and our understanding of what it means to be Jewish is the opportunity of a lifetime."

The experience he brings to the position is relevant and extensive. As a student rabbi, he served in an array of positions, primarily in small communities: teaching at Kulanu Cincinnati Reform Jewish High School, working at the Center for Holocaust and Humanity Education, advising students at the Hillel at Miami University of Ohio, and holding student pulpits at United Hebrew Congregation in Terra Haute, IN, and Temple B'nai Israel of Petoskey, MI.

Rozovsky also has a special commitment to this nation's armed forces. He has served as a military chaplain in multiple settings, and as a fellow at the Jewish War Veterans of America (JWV) Cincinnati-Dayton chapter, Cincinnati, OH; and he has worked for twelve years with the Rhode Island Army National Guard. He also spent a year as a Liaison Officer for the US Army-Israel Defense Forces, in Jerusalem.

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125th Anniversary of The Lake Charles Hebrew Benevolent Association

By 1984, there were enough Jewish families in town to start looking to the future and the start of a Jewish congregation.

Since the Jewish "Faith" does not require "building" for worship but does require purchase of land for a "Jewish" Cemetery, it often indicates the establishment of a Jewish Community.

On September 15, 1894, the Charter was filed. Signatures on the document were: Leopold Kaufman, Solomon Bloch, Julius Frank, Samuel Kaufman, Solomon Mark, Nathan Solomon, Isaac Reinauer, David Reims, Louis Hirsch, Louis Crager, R. Rosenthal, Michael Hirsch, W.H. Wolfson, Joe Rothchilds, Mosie Mach, and Achelle Yendie.

Lake Charles Lodge No 165 F.AM decided to sell to the Jewish Society a portion of their lot on Hodges Street to erect a Synagogue-12 October 1895.

The land for "Hebrew Rest" was purchased on 18 February 1899 from Solomon Bloch (approx. 3 acres)

A display is in the Temple Social Hall and will be up until the middle of September.

The Jewish tradition of placing a stone on a grave goes back to biblical times, when a pile of stones would be erected over a grave, and/or to mark a place of significant importance.


Today, Jews place a pebble on a grave as a symbolic act to indicate that someone has come by to visit and that the deceased has not been forgotten.
