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
Message from the Rubbi:



L'Shanah Tovah!

Before long we shall be wishing each other this beautiful greeting for the Jewish New Year. Whenever I think about or hear these words, so many thoughts quickly arrive.

First, I thank G-d for having given me one more year. Those of us who have had harrowing medical experiences are continually so deeply grateful for each year, each day we are given.



Secondly, I always seem to ponder how I might have done better in the year now ending. What acts of compassion and loving kindness did I overlook in the past months? To whom did I speak thoughtlessly or harshly? What promises did I not fulfill?

Third, I always offer my own personal prayers for my loving family, the dear friends with whom I am blessed, and surely our beloved congregation. As I reflect on these concerns, I quickly remember how our Yuntif Prayers help me pray about all of these thoughts. In our High Holy Day liturgy, we consider how we behaved in the past year.

We certainly express our hopes for living and acting better in the year to come. On Erev Yom Kippur, when we pray and chant the Kol Nidrei, we beseech G-d with these words: "Let all our vows and oaths, all the promises we make and the obligations we incur to You, O G-d, between this Yom Kippur and the next, be null and void should we, after honest effort, find ourselves unable to fulfill them. Then may we be absolved of them." As Rabbi Joseph Telushkin teaches in <u>Jewish Literacy</u>, "One asks to be released in advance from any vows made and not kept. In the 19th century, Sampson Rafael Hirsch, the leading figure of German Orthodox Judaism, suspended recitation of the Kol Nidrei for several years, fearing that it would cause non-Jews to think that Jews do not feel obligated to fulfill their oaths. In actuality, the release requested in the Kol Nidre does not apply to vows made to other people." (Page 569)

I believe it is grand that on Yom Kippur we are already concerning ourselves with how we shall behave in the year ahead, praying that our promises to G-d would disappear should we find ourselves incapable of fulfilling them. Even more, we pray before Kol Nidrei: "For transgressions against God, the day of atonement of atones; but for transgressions of one

human being against another, the day of atonement does not atone until they have made peace with one another."

Here again, our tradition compels us to seek those we have ofended and make peace with them at this time of year. What a magnificent teaching for us all and how better our world would be if everyone complied with this prayer. Yes, L'Shanah Tovah to us all for 5783. Very often, we add the word "M'tu'kah" to our greeting. This word means sweetness.

Thus, "L'Shana Tovah U'M'tu'kah!"

May we all be blessed with a Good and Sweet New Year!

RABBI BARRY'S WORD OF THE MONTH: TASHLIKH

Every year Jewish People around the world perform "Tashlikh". The Jewish Practice of "Tashlikh" comes from the Hebrew for "Throw." Tashlikh is based on the verse in Micah, verse 7:19 "And You [G-d] shall *throw* their sins into the depths of the sea." From these words of Micah, as Rabbi Joseph Telushkin points out in <u>Jewish Literacy</u>, "a Jewish custom arose during the Middle Ages:

On the first day of Rosh ha-Shana...Jews go to a river and symbolically cast their sins into the water. In many communities, people pull out their pockets and shake them, emptying them of the sins they contained...If no nearby river is available, one may observe Tashlikh at a reservoir or at any body of water." (Page 566)

In many regions, such as ours, we throw pieces of bread into the water near the 9/11 Memorial at the edge of "Charlie's Lake", better known as Lake Charles! As we do so, we can often see the fish coming for the bread! We always seem relieved that the fish are actually swallowing our sins! It's also become a social occasion for many of us, including our children who really love this annual custom. We also sound the Shofar with a very loud "Tekiah G'dolah!"

This year we shall observe Tashlikh on the first day of Rosh Hashanah, September 26, at 3:30 pm. I hope you will want to join us!
